The decision was made at around 1:45 on Thursday when the TPAT, the multi-academy trust which St Just is part of, decided to close all its Cornish schools when the weather warning was increased from amber to red.

Obviously this inconvenienced some parents but it was felt that schools should err on the side of caution and keep everyone safe.

In the past the school has closed because of snow but no one can recall it

being because of high winds. Acting Head, Andy Bowman said, "closing the school is something we never do lightly and the decision was taken out of our hands. In Cornwall though the weather can be very different just 5 miles away so I think the right decision was made."

Feeling hungry after their exertions, the children tucked into flatbread, tzatziki and olives. We finished the day by learning about Greek theatre and performed plays based on the story of Perseus and Medusa.

Adam has half as much money as Ben.


What are the coins they each have?
