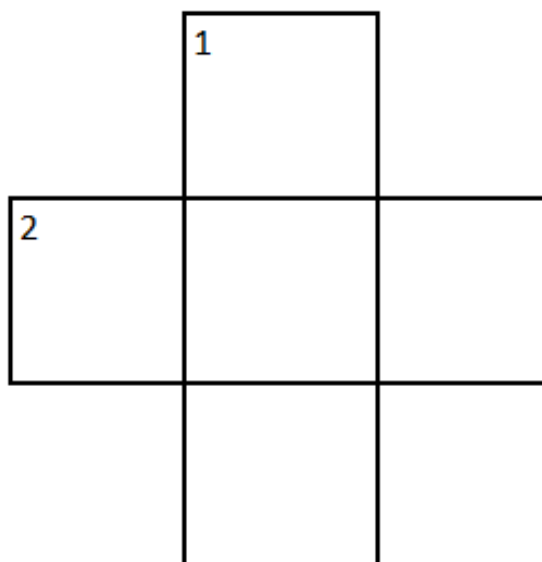

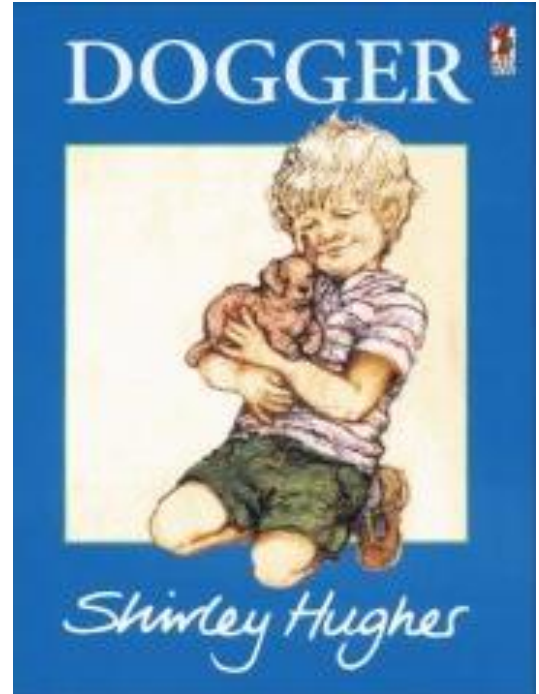
A Good Read



Two weeks ago, author Shirley Hughes passed away at the grand age of 94. For years she wrote about the adventures of Alfie and his sister Annie Rose but it is another of her classics, "Dogger" is this week's "Good Read" chosen by Miss Downing.

Through the character Dave and his sister Bella it explores what it is like when a child nearly loses their favourite toy forever and also the power of kindness when his sister Bella finds a way of getting Dogger back.

Another reason I wanted to choose it is because Shirley Hughes recently died at the age of 94 but she has left such a wealth of amazing books that perfectly capture childhood and so can still be enjoyed by generation after generation.
